## Maud has a new mast

A new wherry mast is not something you can buy off the shelf. It takes time. The project of ensuring Maud has a spare mast began in 2020 and has only now been completed.

In 2020 timber was sourced for a spare mast. It was to be laminated from Douglas Fir as a log of sufficient size and quality could no longer be obtained.

The mast was made up by Broadland Boatbuilders at St Olaves and after rather a lot of skilled shaping the result is in the photo below.

The new mast was put into storage until this year (2025) when it was decided to remove Maud's existing mast and install the new one. The old one would be inspected and stored until needed.

The masts were changed over at St Olaves in September, a process that involved having some new metal parts made, removing the counterbalance weight from the old mast and attaching it to the new.
